



2. Think about where to evacuate

② Evacuation centers and evacuation shelters designated by Ibaraki City

In Ibaraki City, designated evacuation shelters and designated emergency evacuation shelters are set up sequentially, depending on the type of the disaster and the evacuation information issuance classification. Check the Ibaraki City website for the latest setup status of evacuation centers and evacuation shelters.

Table with columns: Type, No, Name, Address, Disaster Type (Flood, Landslide), and Evacuation shelters in the event of typhoon. Includes rows for Elementary School (1-32) and Junior High School (33-37).

(Note) Indicates the number of floors that may be flooded based on the maximum expected inundation depth on the premises of each evacuation shelter in the event of a flood due to the assumed maximum rainfall (1/1000 years).

Symbols in the table

- : Evacuation shelter that opens when a typhoon is approaching, and in the event of floods or landslides
※ : Evacuation shelter that opens when a large-scale flood is expected to occur due to rainfall forecasts, etc., depending on the situation
